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PROCLAMATION

Mayor Wekilsky presented a Proclamation for George Bono

WHEREAS, Boonton native George Bono enlisted in the U.S. Army and began Basic Training in August of 1994. After assignments at Fort Hood, Texas and Fort Knox, Kentucky, George was stationed in Mannheim, Germany for a number of years. He is currently a Staff Sergeant at Fort Carson, Colorado; and

WHEREAS, George served in Kosovo as part of a peacekeeping force during the ethnic conflicts in the Balkans. Later, he served three tours of duty in Iraq. With a Military Occupation Specialty of Motor Transport Operator, George was made Convoy Commander with the MRAP Gun Truck during his last deployment to Afghanistan; and

WHEREAS, George has been awarded six Army Commendation Medals, six Army Achievement Medals, four Good Conduct Medals, the Global War on Terror Expeditionary Medal, the Iraqi Combat Medal with Campaign Star, the Afghanistan Combat Medal with Campaign Star and the Combat Action Badge. Most recently, George was presented the Bronze Star;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Mayor Cyril Wekilsky, on behalf of the Board of Alderman and the People of Boonton, do hereby express our deep gratitude to George Bono

for his tremendous sacrifices in the service of our country. We congratulate him on his much deserved honors and we express to him and his children Sarah and Anthony our best wishes for the future.

Mr. Bono was present, together with his companion and children to accept the proclamation. He thanked his mother, Doreen Dunn for her support throughout his entire military career, as well as his children and girl friend.

CORRESPONDENCE

1. Letter received from Dean Mackey, Treasurer, The Boonton Cemetery Association regarding water service to the Boonton Cemetery located on Boonton Avenue.

Mr. Scozzafava made a motion to accept this letter. Mayor Wekilsky said this cemetery was billed for the first time. This bill was for two quarters, totaling \$94.00. Mr. Scozzafava then made a motion to deny this request. The Mayor said all cemeteries get billed for two quarters per year. Mr. Nevadomski seconded the motion.

Mr. Dunn feels we only have four cemeteries. He knows there are no funds at this particular cemetery and feels, for this minimal amount and their effort to maintain it, he cannot approve this denial. He feels they are using a minimal amount of water for flowers only. Mr. Carey asked how we could make all cemeteries exempt. Mr. Nevadomski disagreed saying the Town just had to raise water rates and we don't know how much water is used at the other cemeteries.

A motion was made to deny the request (of not being billed) and was defeated upon the following roll call vote: Mrs. Bujtas, no; Mr. Carey, yes; Mr. Dunn, no; Mr. Eoga, no; Mr. Looker, no; Mr. Nevadomski, yes; Mr. Scozzafava, yes; and Mayor Wekilsky, no. It was then agreed to have all cemeteries exempt from billing for water (see Resolution 10-114).

MEETING OPEN TO THE PUBLIC

Mayor Wekilsky opened the meeting to the public for discussion.

Sam Pharo, Boonton Holmes Public Library Director: Informed the Mayor and Board that they are preparing to have the building painted and he encouraged everyone on the Board to come see. They are also looking for recommendations on the color

Edith Bacchetta: Asked if any progress has been made to replace the sign on the Sr. Citizens Building. Mayor Wekilsky said he spoke to Mr. Petonak and they are in the process of getting a sign maker to make a more permanent sign, hopefully prior to the Primary Election (June 8, 2010).

Wayne Burcham-Gulotta – Boonton Main Street Trustee: Urged the Board not to cut the budget for this organization. He asked that if cuts must be made, they should be made in conjunction with other cuts being made in the budget.

Harold Johnson, 169 N. Main Street: Boonton Main Street: Also spoke about the proposed cuts to the Boonton Main Street organization, saying the \$50,000 they have been receiving is used for the salary of only one employee – all the others working on Boonton Main Street are volunteers and said if these cuts occur, they will all be penalized.

Peter Andruskiewicz, 121 Banta Lane: Also commented on cuts saying "if it's not broke, don't fix it" – "BBoonton Main Street is working, don't break it".

RESOLUTION OF THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF BOONTON, NEW JERSEY, AUTHORIZING THE RELEASE OF CASH PERFORMANCE BOND

WHEREAS, Thomas D. Menard has entered into an agreement with the Town of Boonton for the construction project located at Block 113, Lots 9.15 – 18 Hapgood Court - and in connection therewith submitted a cash performance bond in the amount of \$ 4,014.00 for a driveway; and

RESOLUTION 10-110

RESOLUTION OF THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF BOONTON OPPOSING SENATE BILL S-458, TRANSFERRING MUNICIPAL TAX ASSESSOR AND TAX COLLECTOR TO THE COUNTY

WHEREAS, Senator Robert Smith (D-17) of Middlesex County and Senator Joseph Kyrillos (R-13) of Monmouth County have introduced legislation, Senate Bill No. S458, that calls for the consolidation of the Office of Municipal Tax Collector, as well as the Office of Municipal Tax Assessor; and

WHEREAS, the legislation calls for the decision to be made on a county to county referendum and calls for the Commissioner of Community Affairs and the Director of the Division of Taxation to develop a comprehensive Master Plan to phase out these municipal offices and transfer them to the county within two years; and

WHEREAS, S458 directs that the plan shall effectuate long range cost savings through the consolidation of these functions with no empirical data or factual studies showing a transfer of

these functions to a county authority will in any way reduce property taxes or improve the delivery of service of these functions; and

WHEREAS, legislation was passed and signed into law last year authorizing a pilot program in Gloucester County to study, over several years, the cost/benefits of county wide tax assessment; and

WHEREAS, the Local Unit Alignment, Reorganization and Consolidation Commission (LUARCC) was approved by the legislature and established on Mach 15, 2007 as part of P.L. 2007, 54 of part of the 2007 Property Tax Relief Act for the purpose of recommending legislative changes which would encourage the more efficient operation of local government; and

WHEREAS some of the conclusions contained in the LUARCC March, 2009 Report "A Quest for Efficiency on Local Government" state: "The main reason for centralizing services is to provide economies of scale or better resources to improve service quality or reduce the costs of delivery." And further states: "That economies of scale do exist, but according to the literature, only for capital-intensive or specialized services that are relatively infrequent at the local level"; and

WHEREAS, LUARCC, in the Executive Summary of the same March, 2009 Report, acknowledges that it will expand its focus to include the efficiency in service delivery and the methods used in the assessment and collection of taxes; and

WHEREAS, the law establishing the Gloucester County pilot program for county wide tax assessment requires LUARCC to evaluate the program aat the end of six (6) years; and

WHEREAS, S458 would usurp the function of the LUARCC, which the legislature created in 2007 and directs the Department of Community Affairs and the Department of Treasury to perform a brief ninety (90) day study of a very complex delivery of services and do so without public input; and

WHEREAS, the findings in the March 2009 LUARCC do not support the premise conveyed in S458 and passage of S458 could cause irreparable damage to the delivery of services and the public's confidence in the functions of Tax Assessor and Tax Collector.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Boonton, County of Morris and State of New Jersey as follows:

1. The Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Boonton oppose Senate Bill No. S458.
2. The Municipal Clerk of the Town of Boonton is instructed to forward a copy of this Resolution to: Governor Chris Christie, Senate President Stephen M. Sweeney, Assembly Speaker Sheila Oliver, Senator Thomas H. Kean Jr., Assemblyman Michael Carroll and Anthony Bucco, Morris County Board of Chosen Freeholders, The New Jersey League of Municipalities, the Tax Collectors and Treasurers Association of New Jersey (TCTANJ), the New Jersey Association of County Tax Boards (NCACTB), and the Association of Municipal Assessors of new Jersey (AMANJ) and all municipalities in the County of Morris.

MAYOR & BOARD OF ALDERMEN COMMITTEE REPORTS

Economic Development: *Mrs. Bujtas said the lease for the Miller Kingsland Property on Lathrop Avenue is still with the County at Green Acres. The committee discussed having an Open House to show the public what the Town owns. Also, all work on this property will be done by volunteers and the caretaker, however, all supplies will have to be supplied by the Town. The Rockaway Valley Garden Club has been working there over the past few days as well as the boy scouts and cub scouts. They are hoping for an Open House during June and are seeking volunteers. They will be issuing press releases as they move forward.*

Police Committee: *Chief Beltran stated it is pedestrian Safety Week. They will be out on Main Street enforcing, not only cross walks, but cell phone users, etc.*

Board of Education: *Mr. Carey said the new officers were installed at their recent meeting.*

MAYOR & BOARD OF ALDERMEN - GENERAL DISCUSSION ITEMS

General Discussion, Announcements and Miscellaneous Items of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen

Mrs. Bujtas commented on the budget process. She also supports the Boonton Main Street organization hoping to restore something to their budget.

Mr. McCue said in order to make changes to the pending budget, he recommends that there be a Finance & Personnel meeting.

Mr. Scozzafava commended the Chief of Police, however, he wonders if there's a trend in some parts of Town. He's become concerned about what he reads in the newspaper, regarding various drug arrests, assaults, etc. and comments that we should crack down on landlords.

Mr. Eoga said the cameras on Main Street have proven to be helpful.

Mr. Dunn commented that information published in the Neighbor News was incorrect regarding the budget. He said the paper said the Town of Boonton lost over \$215,000 when in reality, the Town lost \$751,000 over the last three years. He hopes they'll be a redaction in an upcoming issue of that paper.

Mr. Nevadomski announced that he attended a Fire Department awards dinner recently and several firemen received awards: Jack Middleton, Al Aquino, Bob Beirmeister, Keith Price and Carl Wendt.

MEETING OPEN TO THE PUBLIC

Mayor Wekilsky opened the meeting to the public for discussion.

Sam Pharo: Also supports Boonton Main Street and said the colors being considered for the Library are being chosen with the input of Karen Korinda and Boonton Main Street.

Heather Anan, 329 William Street and Boonton Main Street Trustee: Also urged the Board not to make cuts to the Boonton Main Street Budget.

Harold Johnson: Commented that out of everyone attending this meeting tonight, 1/3 were supporters of Boonton Main Street.

NEW BUSINESS

RESOLUTION 10-113

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING EMERGENCY AWARD OF CONTRACT WITHOUT PUBLIC BIDDING PURSUANT TO N.J.S.A. 40A:11-6

WHEREAS, the Town of Boonton operates a sewer utility that has pipes and mains under the streets and roads of the Town; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Boonton sewer utility operates 4 sewer pumping stations; and

WHEREAS, the pump station located on Toner Road was built 22 years ago and has a 4 inch cast iron force main that conveys sewerage through 2,300 feet of pipe to a higher elevation on Park Avenue; and

WHEREAS, the pipe line has become encrusted with detergents and other minerals that have decreased the inside diameter of the pipe; and

WHEREAS, this condition has caused the 2 pumps in the pump station to only pump 21 gallons/minute as opposed to 110 gallons/minute for which they were designed; and

WHEREAS, the pumps are constantly running and the motors go into overload which will cause the pumps to burn out and need to be replaced; and

WHEREAS, the Superintendent for the Town of Boonton Water and Sewer Utility, by letter dated April 29, 2010, indicate that the pipes have to be replaced to protect our residents from the potential health hazard of untreated sewerage overflowing the wet well and going into the basements of homes on Toner Road; and

WHEREAS, the Town Engineer has by letter dated April 29, 2010 concluded through his investigations that the pipes have to be replaced; and

WHEREAS, the number of contractors who have the experience, availability and reliability to perform this work on an emergency basis is limited; and

WHEREAS, the superintendent has secured two quotes from contractors who are qualified to do this work on an emergency basis; and

WHEREAS, the contractor which submitted the lowest quote of \$74,990, was AmeriDrill, 1201 Edgely Road, Levittown, PA; and

WHEREAS, in order to secure the lowest amount for the project, the Town has agreed to supply all necessary fittings, hose, bituminous HMA, trench stabilization foundation material and fill, and topsoil, seed and mulch, estimated to cost approximately \$16,950; and

WHEREAS, the project engineering coordination, construction administrator and engineering inspection provided by Suburban Consulting Engineers, Inc., is quoted as \$9,600; and

WHEREAS, an actual or imminent emergency exists which requires the performance of replacement of the sewer line; and

WHEREAS, the need for the repair work could not have been reasonably foreseen; and

WHEREAS, the failure to immediately replace the 4" force main sewer line presents the release of sewerage to the environment and to adjoining properties causing significant environmental and health impacts; and

WHEREAS, the contract will be of such limited duration as to meet only the immediate needs of the emergency.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Boonton, Morris County, that the Mayor or Town Administrator is authorized to enter into a contract with AmeriDrill, Levittown, PA, in accordance with a copy of the proposal attached hereto.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Sewer Department is authorized to spend \$16,950.00 to supply the necessary materials to accomplish the replacement of the sewer pipe for a total of \$121,848, which includes a contingency of \$20,308.

Mr. Eoga made a motion to exempt all cemeteries from billing for water, effective immediately, and Mr. Carey seconded.
